cards – whoever drew the Queen of Hearts was dealt a forfeit!












Alice in Wonderland Enrichment Day

Yesterday saw Alice in Wonderland come to life at All Saints through the powers of dance and drama! Sparrows and Doves had lots of fun creating their very own rabbit holes, just like in the story, whilst Eagles got to grips with retelling the events of Wonderland.













Last week, we had a visit from Amy Hatfield, the Wellbeing Consultant for SUAT. She led a staff meeting on Restorative Practice.

What is restorative practice?

Restorative practice is a term used to describe behaviours, interactions and approaches which help to build and maintain positive, healthy relationships, resolve difficulties and repair harm where there has been conflict.

The five core beliefs of Restorative Practice are:

- 1. Everyone has a unique perspective and a valued contribution to make we need to hear what people have to say.
- 2. Our thoughts influence our feelings and both influence what we do and say we need to unpick what is going on behind behaviour.
- 3. Our actions and deeds impact on those around us we need to consider the consequences of our actions.
- 4. All our actions are strategies we have chosen to meet our needs at the time we need to be part of identifying what we need and identifying how our needs will be met.
- 5. The people who are affected by an issue or problem are those best placed to find ways forward in collaboration with each other we need to be enabled and empowered to make positive and sustainable changes for ourselves.

Restorative practices range from formal to informal processes that enable teachers, school staff, children and their families to communicate effectively. The processes used focus upon:

- * removing barriers
- * proactively promoting a sense of community
- * understanding social responsibility and shared accountability

Why are we doing it?

These approaches provide staff with a range of language, behaviours and tools that strengthen their relationships with children and families, empowering them to share responsibility by using a solution-

focused approach, which supports positive change. Here at All Saints, we already use many of the elements of this approach through our school values and nurturing ethos, however it may provide us with more structure.

How are we doing it?

Check-ins with children and Circle and group discussions help students to share their feelings, build relationships, problem solve and play an active role in challenging and supporting one another.

What will it look like at All Saints?

Check-ins will take place during the week to see how children are and to build relationships. If an incident of poor behaviour takes place, the child may be moved away from the situation to calm down. If appropriate, once the child is calm and the staff member has an appropriate meeting time, the adult and child will then meet to discuss the incident.

A series of 6 questions will be asked-

- -What happened?
- -What were you thinking at the time?
- -What have you thought since?
- -Who has been affected?
- -How have they been affected?
- -What do you need?

Not every incident needs to be resolved with this kind of meeting. If following a meeting, the incident is not resolved then either myself or Mrs. Mayhew would have a second restorative meeting and following that restorative meetings will then be held with parents.

This practice will be reflected in our new Reflection and Behaviour policy that I will share with parents once it is ready.

It is imperative that you cross the road to collect your child at the end of the school day. School staff are NOT allowed to send your children across the road to you and will not do so. They cannot judge the traffic from where they are standing and it is therefore unsafe.

I appreciate that the lane can be very quiet, however, we have had an incident in the past where a police

chase literally went through Bednall at home time and straight past school. It doesn't bear thinking about what could have happened if children had been released to parents on the other side of the road.

We also ask that children are NOT let out from vehicles in the middle of the road and parents park up first. We will also not be sending children out to vehicles in the road that are not parked up.

We MUST put your children's safety first. Thank you for your support with this matter.
